Significant Events

A structure fire was reported on Peachtree Street in the early morning hours of April 6th. When the fire was extinguished, sadly two people had perished inside. This incident is still under investigation at this time. If you have any information, please contact the Cocoa Police Department.



On the evening of April 10th, **McArthur Moon** was seen by officers to be driving without his seat belt on. As the officer began to pull **Moon** over, he sped up, and made no indication that he was going to stop. **Moon** abruptly stopped his car after gaining some distance from the police car, and attempted to flee the scene. Officers gave chase and **Moon** was taken into custody several blocks away from his abandoned car. **Moon** was charged with **4 counts of Fleeing/Eluding, Driving while License Suspended, No Valid Driver's License, 2 active warrants, and issued multiple citations.**

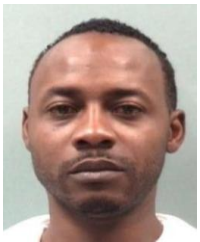

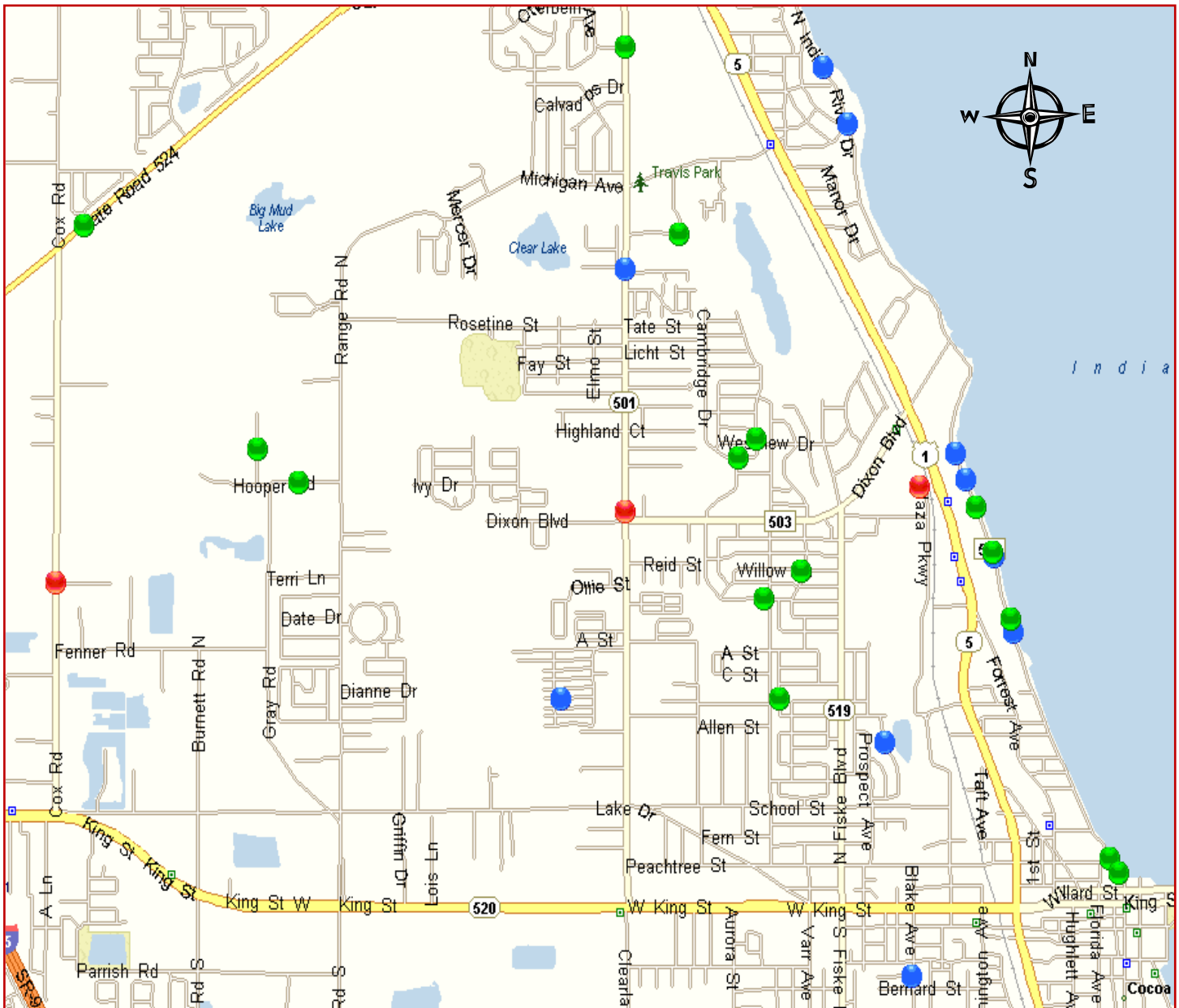

BURGLARY PREVENTION TIPS

Burglary Basics

- Make your home look occupied.
- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave the house or go to bed.
- Leave lights on when you go out. Use automatic timers for extended vacations.
- Keep your garage door closed and locked. (While at Home or Away!)
- Do not allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers or flyers build up while you are away.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended time.
- Pushbutton locks are easy for burglars to open. Install deadbolt locks on all your outside doors.
- Sliding glass doors are vulnerable. Special locks are available for better security.

Do Not Tempt a Thief

- Lawn mowers, snow blowers, grills, tools, and bicycles are best stored out of sight.
- Always lock your sheds and garages.
- Use curtains on all windows.
- Never leave notes on your door such as "Gone shopping."
- Do not leave the boxes of high valued items you just purchased by the roadway until trash day.

Locks

- No lock can be 100% effective. Ask a locksmith for advice on your situation.
- Change locks immediately if your keys are lost or stolen.
- When moving into a new home, have all locks changed.
- Always lock your vehicles! (Do not leave any valuables in your vehicle.)

Targeting the Outside

- Have adequate exterior lighting. A motion-sensitive light is recommended for backyards.
- Trim trees and shrubs so that they cannot be used as hiding places for intruders.
- Make sure your door hinges are on the inside.
- Install shrubbery to include, bougainvillea, hawthorns, and roses.

Windows

- Most windows can be pinned for security.
- Drill a 3/16" hole on a slight downward slant through the inside window frame and halfway into the outside frame - place a nail in the hole to secure the window.

Alarms

- An alarm system is excellent for home security. It provides peace of mind to homeowners, especially while on vacation. There are a variety of alarm systems on the market.
- Make several inquiries to different companies for the best security system available to you.

If your home is broken into or if you come home to find an unexplained open/broken window or door

- Do not enter - the perpetrator may still be inside.
- Use a neighbor's phone to call police.
- Do not touch anything or clean up until the police have inspected for evidence.
- Write down the license plate numbers of any suspicious vehicles.
- Note the descriptions of any suspicious persons.

Other precautions you should take

- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places -- burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuable possessions, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home.
- Install a peephole
- Be a good neighbor. Call 911 immediately if you notice anything suspicious in your neighborhood.
- Mark your valuables with your name or symbol with an engraver you can borrow from your precinct. Marked items are harder for a burglar to dispose of and easier for police to recover.
- Form a Neighborhood Watch Group. We can help you work with your neighbors to improve security and reduce risk of burglary.

The MOST important thing YOU can do is CALL THE POLICE to report a CRIME or any SUSPICIOUS activity. You have to be the eyes of your neighborhood. Remember you can always remain a pair of anonymous eyes!

*** The 4 most important elements that will help you reduce your chances of becoming a victim are:

- 1) Install an alarm, 2) Secure your property, 3) Form a crime watch, and 4) Report all suspicious activity.

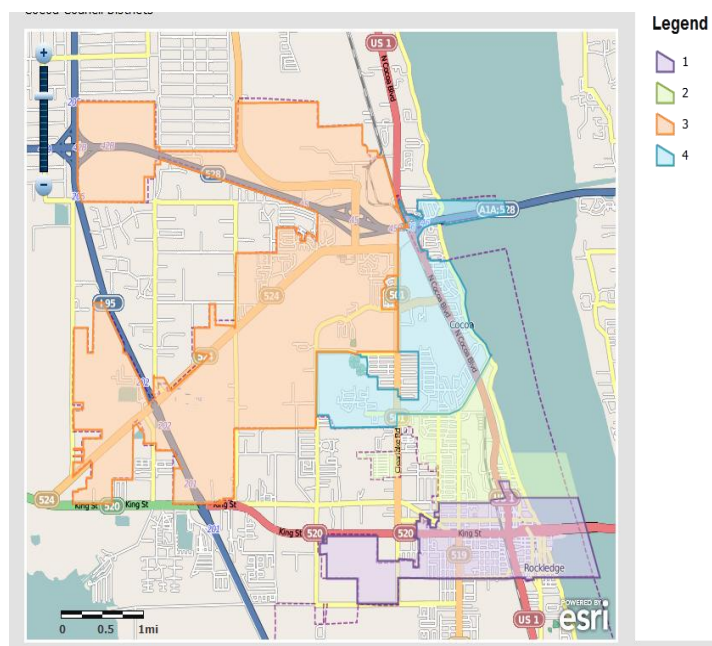
